A regular City Council Meeting of Hanahan City Council was held on Tuesday, September 10, 2019 in the Debbie Lewis Municipal Chambers at 1255 Yeamans Hall Road in Hanahan at 6:30pm. The meeting was advertised in the Post and Courier, as was the Public Hearing for the FOIA new fee table proposal. The Agenda was posted on the City of Hanahan webpage and a copy of the Agenda was posted on the lobby bulletin board at least 24 hours prior to the meeting. Mayor Christie Rainwater presided. The Council Members that were present at tonight's meeting were Kevin Hedgpeth, Mike Sally, Joel Hodges, Mike Dyson, Mayor Pro Tem Chandler and Council Member Owens. We had a quorum for tonight's meeting.

Staff members that signed the visitor's log were: Mike Cochran - City Administrator, Jon Ellwood – IT, Hilary VanOrsdel – HR, Larry Sturdivant – Building & Codes, Joe Gill – Public Works, Bo Bowers – Fire Chief, Kristy Duffy – Finance, Randy MoneyMaker – Rec Dept., Doug Rogers – Senior Center, Dennis Turner – Police Chief, Tyler Dempsey – Building & Codes, and Jeff Hajek – Building & Codes,. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Rainwater called the Tuesday, September 10, 2019 City Council Meeting to order at 6:30 pm.

INVOCATION

The invocation was led bt Rev. LaShaun Flagg of St. Luke AME Church tonight.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Pro Tem Chandler led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

A moment of silence was taken in memory of Mr. Tom Heiden. We learned last week of his passing and we were saddened, as he was amazing and integral part of our recreation team for many years. He was truly one of a kind and will be missed by so many.

The Mayor wanted to thank Fire, Police, Lineman, and the sacrifice of their families. Thank all volunteers who bagged sand and cleaned up. Thank all businesses who donated. Hanahan strong! Hanahan is an amazing city that always pulls together. (Standing ovation was given)

RECOGNITIONS

- A. Chief Turner joined Mayor Rainwater in swearing in of three (3) new police officers; Robert Tennant, Beth Rowell, and Darris Goss.

1. **Officer Beth Rowell** was born and raised in Allendale, SC to a family of public servants. Her father was Chief of Allendale County and her mother a 23-year nursing veteran. Officer Rowell pursued a degree in criminal justice from Charleston Southern University, where she graduated in 2018. Officer Rowell will be getting married next year, to her fiancé Noah. She looks forward to doing all that she can to serve the people of Hanahan and thanks each of them for this opportunity.
2. **Officer Robert Tennant** was born in the Charleston area. He enlisted in the Navy right after graduation and served four (4) years as an Operation Specialist. After receiving an honorable discharge, Robert moved back to SC where he started his law enforcement career with Aiken City Pubic Safety and worked there for five (5) years. He then went to North Augusta for six (6) years. Most recently he was Sullivan's Island PD, prior to moving back to the Charleston area.
3. **Officer Darris Goss** is originally from Fontana, California. He graduated from Summit High School and moved to South Carolina in 2015. Previously, he has worked at Lieber Corrections Facility and the Dorchester County jail and with Lost Prevention at Target. In his off time, he enjoys working out and hiking. Just recently, Officer Goss graduated from the Police Academy. Welcome Officers Tennant, Rowell, and Goss!

The Oaths were all signed, and pictures were taken during their swearing in.

- B. Council Member Owens read the **Airbag Safety Recall Repair Month Proclamation**. This Proclamation proposal was submitted by Alexandria Rodriguez of GMMB and a copy of our communication via email, is included in the council packet.
- *A motion to declare September 2019 as Airbag Safety Recall Repair Month was made by Council Member Owens.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Sally. There was no discussion.*
 - *The motion was called. No one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

- C. Council Member Hodges read the **Pain Awareness Month Proclamation**. This Proclamation proposal was submitted by US Pain Foundation Ambassador, Mr. Roy Cantrell. A copy of his letter of request to the Mayor was included in the council packet. The Proclamation stated that 50 million people suffer with chronic pain 3 months or more due to stress. We should work to lower our stress as a society. 50 billion dollars is spent on chronic pain each year.
- *A motion to declare September 2019 as Pain Awareness Month was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Owens.*
 - *There was no discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*
- D. Council Member Hedgpeth read the **Suicide Prevention Awareness Month Proclamation**. The Proclamation stated that according to the United States Center for Disease and Control, each year more than 41,000 people die by suicide. Additionally, suicide is the 10th leading cause of death among adults in the US and the 2nd leading cause of death among people aged 10-24.
- *A motion to declare September 2019 Suicide Prevention Awareness Month was made by Mayor Pro Tem Chandler.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Sally.*
 - *There was no discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*
- E. Chief Bowers took the podium to award the meritorious citation to his crew for their heroic actions on August 19, 2019 at a basement fire at 1082 Stonehenge Drive. Resident of the home, Ms. Breanne Kudak; former Assistant Principal of Meavers Charter School spoke and reiterated the story of the house fire. She stated that the fire was under control and out, within 5 minutes and she thanked each of the members of the crew for their service. She is hopeful that she will be able to return home by October 30th. Crew members that were awarded were: Tower 2701 - Deputy Chief Bargeron, Relief Driver Jackson Kackley, Firefighters Brenden Shaw and Taylor Campbell. Medic 2701's crew consisted of Engineer/Paramedic Finneran and Firefighter/Paramedic Kase and Rourke. Engine 2703 consisted of: Engineer/EMT Hancock and Firefighter/EMT McMillin. Engine 2702 consisted of: Captain/EMT Lindler and Firefighter/EMT Wooten.

CITIZENS COMMENTS REGARDING AGENDA ITEM ONLY

The Mayor then opened the meeting for Citizens comments regarding Agenda items only.

- *There were no Citizen Comments.*

There being no further input, The Mayor closed this segment of the meeting.

CONSENT AGENDA: Consent Agenda items are adopted with a single motion, second, and vote unless a request for removal is heard from a Council Member. Items on the September 10, 2019 Consent Agenda were:

- 1. Approval of the Minutes from the August 13, 2019 City Council Meeting.**
 - *A motion to approve the Minutes from the August 13, 2019 was made by Council Member Sally.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
 - *There was no discussion.*
 - *Motion was called. The vote was 5-2 (2 abstained - Owens & Chandler).*
- 2. Approval of the Minutes from the August 27, 2019 Council Workshop Meeting.**
 - *A motion to approve the Minutes from the August 27, 2019 Council Workshop Meeting was made by Council Member Owens.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Sally.*
 - *There was no discussion*
 - *Motion was called. The vote was 5-2 (2 abstained – Hodges & Dyson).*
- 3. Athletic Fields Fencing Bid** has been awarded to the one firm that submitted all required documents for the project. That firm was Carrier Construction, LLC for a bid of \$178,221.00. Council Member Hedgpeth made a motion for discussion. Council Member Sally asked since we only received one bid, do you want to send it back out for another? Randy Moneymaker, Director of Parks & Recreation replied by saying that we did what we are supposed to, we put it out for public bid. Mayor Pro Tem Chandler asked, by ordinance, aren't we supposed to receive 3 bids/quotes? Council Member Owens asked is what we are asking for, more than normal? Randy Moneymaker replied by saying no and that he personally spoke with 3 businesses. We advertised for the bid publicly.
 - *A motion to accept the athletic fields fencing bid was made by Council Member Owens.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
 - *There was no further discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

4. **Resolution #4-2019 – Debt Set Off** was read by Kristy Duffy, Finance Director. The Setoff Debt Collection Act allows the SC Department of Revenue to render assistance in the collection of debt owed to political subdivisions of the State. This is our third year using this program. It allows people's tax refunds to come out of their State refund. We use the Municipal Association to collect past dues. It gives authority. Council Member Sally asked if they do our EMS billing, to which Kristy Duffy, Finance Director replied no. Council Member Hedgpeth stated they just authorize. The average collection was \$30K last year. Last year, was their first for court and it was small. There was a change in bench warrants. We will do this again next year and expect to get more past due collections back.
 - *A motion to approve Resolution #4-2019 – Debt Set Off was made by Council Member Sally.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
 - *There was no further discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

5. Mike Cochran, City Administrator discussed the installation of the **hurricane shutters** and announce that the hurricane shutters bid has been awarded to GD&C Inc. Cochran stated that these were a budgeted item and that the Fire Department took the lead on this. The shutters will be Class 4 hurricane impact. Budget of \$62K. The prices came back a little higher due to windows being omitted. Cost is 53% reimbursable by FEMA. We want to use the Courtroom as EOC. Currently, being operated in a small conference room at Station 1. Council Member Hedgpeth seconds everything mentioned about EOC. Council Member Sally asked how the generators did that were purchased a few years back. Fire Chief Bowers said that we are planning for the future to power the complex. Currently, they only power dispatch. New generator powers the gym and holds 500 gallons. Next year we hope to bring power over. Council Member Sally said that he thought that the gym would be used for EDC. Fire Chief Bowers said no, there isn't shelter or personnel distribution point there. The gym is not rated as a shelter to house staff, cook, clean, and assist essential staff. Once the storm has cleared, we could use that facility for non-essential personnel, for cooking, storage, etc. Council Member Sally asked are the generators enough and how do we know that? Randy MoneyMaker, Parks and Recreation Director replied that he knows it would be powerful enough because of the company install, that the generator made comment that it's an awful lot of generator/power to run just the gym. He was told then it could tie into City Hall. The generator was \$80K. Council Member Sally expressed his concern asked if we got a quote for the folding style shutters as well. He stated that Bahama style shutters aren't ringing well with him. Fire Chief Bowers said that Station 1 which looks like window screen would be \$79K. Roll down aluminum style shutters would

be \$134K. Council Member Sally asked if all of the windows open. Mike Cochran stated that yes, all of our windows do open, even on the second floor. Fire Chief Bowers said that the Bahama style shutters are more eye pleasing, to which City Administrator, Mike Cochran added that the color will match the existing window and will stop debris from coming through the window.

- *A motion was made by Mayor Pro Tem Chandler to award the bid.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Sally*
- *There was no further discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

6. Mike Cochran discussed the **yearly contract for maintenance of City HVAC** and stated that two bids were received. Pardee Heating and Air over included on their bid; which is why their bid was so high. Johnson Controls has local government representative. Mayor Rainwater asked if this was for every unit across the city and Council Member Sally piggybacked by asking is this a budgeted item. Mike Cochran, replied with yes to both and some of the units are 20 years old and said that he is recommended an Intent to Award to Johnson Controls, for the monthly maintenance, monitoring and recommended two cleanings per year with coils, etc. Johnson Controls offer was \$18,998.00.

- *A motion was made by Council Member Sally.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Owens.*
- *There was no further discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

NEW BUSINESS – We moved on to new business

A. Mr. Mike Hemmer, from the Council of Governments presented to us, the Hazard Mitigation Plan Update. Madeline Adams was also in attendance, as well as Katherine. Mr. Hemmer stated that they have identified some hazards. There are 2 levels – county goals and objectives. He said that they need to know, what they don't know about our city. If there is a hazard, they need to know. There are 11 goals for our jurisdiction which are on the handout he gave out (page 2). The 11 goals are:

- strive to minimize the threat from a hazard event in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of the community.
- strive to have the capability to initiate and sustain emergency response operations during and after a hazard event.
- availability and functioning of the community's infrastructure will not be significantly disrupted by a hazard event.

- strive to educate citizens to understand the hazards threatening local areas and the techniques to minimize vulnerability to those hazards.
- continuity of local government administration and services will not be significantly disrupted by a hazard event.
- capability to develop, implement and maintain effective hazard loss reduction programs.
- strive to minimize the vulnerability of homes, institutions and places of business and employment to hazard events.
- policies and regulations of local government and public entities will support effective hazard mitigation programming throughout the community.
- strive to reduce the impact of hazard events on the economic stability of the County.
- all sectors of the community will work together to create a disaster resistant-region.
- strive to reduce the impact of hazard events on the natural and cultural resources of the County.

Mayor Pro Tem Chandler asked the functionality of their group; do you document it, or do you actually act on it. Mr. Hemmer replied by saying that they are our planners, they review the plan. Council Member Sally chimed in by stating that we entered into the CRS Program and this helps with those discounts/ratings. Mr. Hemmer agreed. He then went on to say that all 6 jurisdictions have used the plan in the past and will likely approve the plan again. Mayor Rainwater asked when they anticipate approval by us. Mike Hemmer stated within a few months, by the end of the year. Council Member Sally said trying to think ahead of things pushed down by Federal Government, he wanted to know about the MS4 permits. Madeline stated that they just started looking into Stormwater as a region. As far as she is aware, no regarding permits. What happens upstream, happens downstream. Mike Hemmer stated that unregulated dams might become a problem and getting them regulated. They would suggest getting the dams regulated. Madeline stated it is more of a question for DHEC but she thinks it is likely in the works.

- B. City Council held a Public Hearing to discuss **Ordinance #6-2019** – An Ordinance for Freedom of Information Act Fee Table for FOIA Requests and Council will vote on the Introduction and First Reading of this Ordinance. The Ordinance is to request a fee increase associated with FOIA requests with the city. The Ordinance was first introduced by Hilary VanOrsdel, HR Director.
- *A motion to hold a Public Hearing to discuss Ordinance #6-2019 was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
 - *A second was made by Council Member Owens.*
 - Council Member Hedgpeth asked regarding the new fee table, I see that video discs and picture discs are both \$25 per disc. What if the person requesting

material only needs one picture would they still be charged \$25 for the picture disc. Hilary VanOrsdel replied with yes, as the fee is to cover the costs of the equipment, employee(s) time to pull the information, shipping, etc.

Citizens comments:

- Roy Cantrothy (last name?) of 1253 Dickson Avenue stated that he has worked with FOIA a good bit and that our fees are way below standard of other agencies/cities. These are way cheap.
- Johnny Harkness of 1036 Dominion Drive said regarding the new fee table, he noticed that the increments were only done in hourly rates, to which he asked, what if the information only took 5 minutes, rather than an hour to get. Hilary VanOrsdel, HR Director answered him by stating the costs are based on 15 minutes increments, and that charge would be at a reduced rate. Mr. Harkness went on to say that he has had issues in the past with getting charged for 5 hours' worth of FOIA fees, when it shouldn't have taken that long, but due to improper filing; it took the employee longer to find the requested information. He didn't think that was fair that he should get charged for our lack of filing. Hilary VanOrsdel responded by stating that we have recently done a lot of document retention for the ease of our staff trying to locate files and for a quicker response time for our citizens, as well.
- *A motion to close the public hearing was made by Council Member Owens.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Hedgpeth to close the public hearing.*
- *A motion to approve Ordinance #6-2019 was made by Council Member Sally.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Owens.*
- *There was no further discussion. The motion was called; no one opposed. The vote was 7-0.*

C. Kristy Duffy, Finance Director presented the LOST presentation to City Council for approval. A handout was given and has been included in the minutes/council packet. Tax bills are getting ready to go out, Kristy stated. It's that fun time of year.

- What is LOST? It is 1% Levy, approved by voters, on taxable sales within the County.
- The handout reflects the actual for the last 3 years. We are finally getting up in percent bracket.
- SCDOR collects the revenue and splits it into two accounts:
 1. -Property Tax Credit Fund (71%)
 - the County receives 67% and the
 - Municipality receives 33% by their % of County Population.
 2. -County/Municipal Revenue Fund (29%)
 - 50% based on % of County Population
 - 50% based on Location of the Sale

- In 2014 we decided to change the milage rate. We actually just started collecting in 2017-2018.
- The condensed version is on page 4 of Kristy's handout. She said that you will notice the big blue arrow as that is the number (\$1,612.550.30) that excites everyone. That is the actual tax relief amount to be distributed next year to taxpayers of the City of Hanahan.
- The 29% Breakout: LOST= 71% give back, 29% keep
29% Breakout= 17% fleet, 7% facility, and 5% capital
- 2019 LOST Credit Factor- for 2018 the tax credit factor for the next year (November 2019) was .008 and this year, for 2019, the tax credit factor will be .009, which is about \$29 more.
- Bills go out in November of each year.
- Advalorem Taxes are made up of normal property taxes, delinquent taxes, and TIF taxes (which have now expired). The majority of the revenue comes in December, January, and February of each year. An example given was that fir a house worth \$200K, their tax credit in 2018 was \$167 and in 2019, their tax credit will be \$196, which is \$29 more.
- There were no questions/comments from the Council or citizens.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- A. Mike Cochran, City Administrator gave an update on the 53-Acre Park.
- After the last workshop, he made some calls.
 - One call was to a timber company. One way to reduce some of the general expenses would be go in and harvest the timber. We don't have any actual numbers yet, but I am working on it.
 - He contacted a Bond Attorney and has reviewed different finding scenarios. Bond 5, 7, and 10 years – the money is cheap. Speaking with the attorney, they believe that the 10-year bond is the way to go. We don't want to obligate all of our capital expenditures towards one project.
 - Site work is critical and very expensive. We anticipate high usage, so we need to be certain the fields aren't mush/ flooded.
 - Based on the design from Seamon Whiteside LLC, we won't know any amounts/dollar figures until we put it out for bids. Everything in the park is everything that already know. There aren't any water features. There isn't much that could be taken out to reduce. By the time the park is done, we will have doubled our population in the city. The idea with the park is to start moving forward. Council Member Owens said that he has real heartache knowing this park could be in excess of \$13 million. He thought it would be more like \$4 million. He thinks that maybe we should only do half of the park for now, not knowing how the future may look. Council Member Sally agreed. He thinks we could take out some things and maybe just do half for now. Mayor

Rainwater said her concern is only building half of the park, being a mother of young children. She doesn't like the idea of having more construction and construction vehicles once the park has been half done. Council Member Owens wants to see a better breakdown of the park's costs, like they had with the Amphitheatre. He said it's just a lot of money, for a normally conservative city with spending. Mike Cochran said that we would have to put it out for a bid to get a better understanding of breakdown of costs. Kitty Farias, in Finance would be the one who put out the bids. Mayor Pro Tem Chandler said that he would like that. He too wants to see a cost breakdown. He thinks that half a park is better than no park. He is not prepared to vote on bonding money today, he isn't comfortable with it. Mike Cochran said that in 30 years he hopes that his grandchildren, should he have any by then, will also be playing on this park. He went on to say that each year, we will budget. If we set up the bond, it would be a manageable item over 10 years. Council Member Hedgpeth said to be clear we wouldn't be bonding the entire expense of the park. Mike Cochran said yes, that's correct. We have money budgeted and BCSD will also be paying and a potential bond. Council Member Sally also stated that he wanted to make sure we had warranty on the work. Mayor Pro Tem also said that he wanted the soil tested to make sure that it is the correct soil for the fields. Mike Cochran said that some soil testing has been done already. Council Member Sally said that it is a pretty rare time that we complete the park with the ability to money this cheap. It's a pretty good situation on our part. Mayor Rainwater said that we have to be wise stewards. We have been given 53 acres of land and she believes that the park should be done at once. She went on to say who knows what that land would have even cost if it wasn't given to us. She believes that the park is needed. Mike Cochran will follow up on timber and will get with Kitty Farias for bidding. Council Member Sally asked if we have finalized the plan of the park. Mike Cochran said basically what we have is a rough plan. We can add/delete whatever we may need. It would be a la carte if we are looking at getting pricing for each item for the park. We can choose our options.

- No other questions.

REPORTS AND COMMENTS:

A. CITIZENS COMMENTS

The meeting was opened for citizens' comments and there were none at this time. This portion of the meeting was closed.

B. CITY ADMINISTRATOR

- Mike Cochran gave his Administrator's report and thanks Berkeley County for the storm clean up. There were diligent efforts in Otranto today, and Public Works will be back out tomorrow and even likely working a few hours on Saturday. It is going to take a little while to get all the cleanup done. Our Public Works fellas are working hard. They are doing 2-3 routes a day. They normally are done by 2'ish but they have been working until 5:00 each day. Mayor Pro Tem Chandler asked if there was FEMA reimbursement for the overtime. Mike Cochran's answer was yes, and Public Works is killing it. They will be out all day Saturday working as well.
- Boat Landing Boardwalk regulatory paperwork was approved in early June and final permitting is still in process.
- Village Renaissance Grant – the BCD COG has this project; design alternatives still being reviewed.
- Flooding Turkey Creek – ACOE was supposed to report this month but hurricane led to evacuation of many of their personnel. They will be at the October meeting with their report and preliminary findings.
- Downtown Revitalization – Power line boring work is being planned by Dominion. Once complete, this project will be nearly done. There are some punch list items that still need to be addressed. Mayor Rainwater asked where will the lines that will be buried end? Mike Cochran answered said about 100 yard past the fire station and down to Checkers. There is still some paving on Carolyn Drive to be done. They still have to fix that area before we sign off on anything.
- Railroad Ave. – The SCDOT is scheduled to put this project out to bid this month.
- Golf Tournament – The annual Yeamans Hall Club Golf Tournament fundraiser was a great success; the net was approximately \$17,000 that will go towards an improvement at the Amphitheater. Emily Huff did an outstanding job with the planning of it. Jason and his team, from right across the street at First Citizens were real ringers. They won the tournament.
- Hanahan Night at CSU is this Saturday at 6pm. He plans to recognize former Hanahan Principals. Tickets will be \$5 for Hanahan residents. Kids who wear their Hanahan jerseys can get in for free.
- Children's Charity Run/Walk in Mt. Pleasant will be on 9/21.
- Tanner Trail update – we met with Ryan and we are still in the design phase of that.

C. MAYOR AND COUNCIL COMMENTS

Comments from Council were

- Mayor Pro Tem Chandler asked about the timing of the generator. Mike Cochran said that will be next years budget. Council Member Owens said that he would like it done sooner rather than later, maybe mid-year budget.
- Mayor Pro Tem Chandler asked about the Reverse 911. Jon Ellwood, IT Director said that it pushes out messages in groups of 10, so it likely takes about 8-10 minutes. Mayor Pro Tem Chandler then asked if it had capabilities of doing voice messaging. Jon Ellwood stated that it has voice, text and picture capabilities. Mayor Pro Tem Chandler said, for example the scheduled power outages, this would be a great way to alert residents of this rather than Mike Cochran and City Hall getting all of the phone calls. Mike Cochran said that he would look into it and it to his "After Action Plan Meeting". He thinks that SMS messaging works better than phone calls, as most people ignore calls.
- Mayor Pro Tem Chandler echoed his thanks for all of the extra hours put in for the storm throughout all of the department's city wide. Council Member Owens added a thank you to the middle and high school students for their volunteering of time with helping bag up sandbags, etc. That really shows what our city really is. Mayor Rainwater said that she visited the schools today to thank the students, as they were unable to attend tonight's meeting.
- There were no other comments from the Council.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Council needs to go into Executive Session to discuss Real Estate Transaction. No action is to be taken while in session.

- *A motion to go into Executive Session to discuss a Real Estate Transaction was made by Council Member Owens.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Hedgpeth.*
- *Motion was called. The vote was 7-0 to go into Executive Session.*
- *Council returned from Executive Session at 8:58pm and no action was taken.*

ADJOURNMENT

- *There being no further business to discuss tonight, a motion to adjourn was made by Mayor Pro Tem Chandler.*
- *A second was made by Council Member Hodges.*
- *There wasn't any discussion. The motion was called, and the vote was 7-0.*
- *The meeting adjourned at 9:00pm.*
